

Jamie Bell

Jamie Bell (real name: Andrew James Matfin), was born in Billingham (north England) on 14th March 1986. He's an actor and dancer.

Dance steps

At only 14 years old Jamie made his debut* at the cinema playing Billy Elliot in the film of the same name by Stephen Daldry. It's the story of a young boy who lives in a mining*

town and who discovers a passion for classical dance. To follow his dreams he has to fight against poverty and his family's resistance, who send him to boxing lessons. In the end his tenacity* wins.

The film obtained numerous Oscar and Golden Globe nominations and Jamie won a BAFTA as best leading actor.



Billy Elliot today is also a successful West End musical with music by Elton John, exported all around the world. It has won four Olivier Awards (the most important English theatre award) and ten Tony Awards (the most prestigious* theatre prize in the USA).

Jamie's words

His grandmother, his mum, his aunt and his sister are all dancers. And so Jamie, who loves tip tap, started taking dancing lessons at a very early age. He kept it a secret at the beginning from his school friends so they wouldn't make fun* of him. «They called me "boy-dancer". But they made me determined to show that dancing isn't just for girls... My personal story is very similar to Billy's. To play him, all I had to do was to remain as myself».

As a grown up

After having demonstrated his talent as an actor and dancer, Jamie acted in films where the sweetness of Billy Elliot was left behind and he took on* more adult and more aggressive roles. He had the opportunity to work with Peter Jackson in *King Kong* (2005) and with Clint Eastwood in *Flags of Our Fathers* (2006). In 2011 he was the voice of Tintin in the animated film *The Adventures of Tintin: The Secret of the Unicorn*, directed by Steven Spielberg and based on the famous comic strip.

In 2015 he played Ben Grimm – alias the Thing – in the new Marvel film dedicated to the Fantastic Four.

Shop

In this feature we're going to take a look at some quite 'strange' places that exist in the UK and where we can get something to eat, do some shopping or maybe just hang out with friends. Maybe you've been to one of these places or even have something similar where you come from? Read on to find out more.

Shipping Containers

Nowadays, renting a physical store can be quite expensive so English man Roger Wade came up with* a cheaper idea. Opening a series of small shops in old shipping containers, the big metal boxes that are used to transport things around the world on ships. He opened the first pop-up* shopping centre in Shoreditch in London and others followed. The original one has 19 restaurants and 27 shops and you can also listen to music concerts and watch films while you shop. How cool is that?



Alice in Wonderland

Have you read the book by Lewis Carroll? Would you like to visit a shop which is full of objects and items from the story? Well you can in the heart of London. You can find this place near Charing Cross Station. The shop was opened by Jake Fior who used to be a second-hand* book seller and a music producer, who came across* an antique* chessboard which had been painted by hand by Sir John Tenniel, who illustrated* the original Alice in Wonderland stories. He decided to make a collection and travelled around Britain looking for other Alice objects in markets and antique shops.

Car Boot Sales

Do you have some old things that you want to get rid of*? Well, all you need is your parents' car and off you go. A car boot sale is a kind of market usually in a field or a car park, where a lot of people sell things out of the boot of their car (the back part of the car where you put your suitcase and bags). They usually sell their old clothes, books, games and sometimes even furniture. All you have to remember is not to use all the profits by buying things from the other sellers!



A shop for monsters

This is a very particular shop also in the heart of London and its potential customers are monsters, vampires and werewolves*! The original shop was opened in 1818 and the style of the modern day shop is a 19th century pharmacy. The shop sells clothes, accessories*, sweets and other things to eat all with a monster theme. The shop is a part of a project set up* by writer Nick Hornby (*High Fidelity*, *Fever Pitch*, *About a Boy*) called the Ministry of Stories to encourage young people to start writing. The money from the shop is donated to the project.

Vintage Games

Are you addicted to your X-Box? Are you always playing on your Playstation? Then, this could be the shop for you! It's called Retro Game Base and is located on Streatham High Road in London. It's full of the games from the 1980s and 1990s such as PacMan, Super Mario Bros, Donkey Kong and Tetris. All these games nowadays seem very simple compared to the ones today full of special effects and computer graphics, but they're no less enjoyable to play. You can have hours of fun inside the shop and play some of the games from the very beginning of gaming history!

The cameras are rolling! But it isn't a film set!



There are many places around the world that have become famous tourist attractions after appearing in films and TV series as they offer a perfect background for cinema and TV productions. Let's go on a short trip to some 'invented' places... that really exist.

Harry Potter was here!

For the most well-loved wizard of the cinema, who was penned* by J.K. Rowling, everything began at King's Cross station in London, where Harry took the train to go to Hogwarts. The secret access* to platform 9 ¾ is well visible thanks to the famous luggage trolley that disappears through the wall. There's also the opportunity to take a photo (wearing the Gryffindor scarf) and visit the nearby* shop dedicated to Harry Potter's magical universe.

Between England and Scotland

The Hogwarts Express is a real steam train (the Jacobite Steam Train) which crosses the Scottish Highlands passing over the scenographic* Glenfinnan bridge, which is 380 metres long, and 30 metres high and supported by 21 arches. It was built between 1897 and 1901. The train arrives in the little station of Goathland (in the book and the film it's called Hogsmeade), a village in North Yorkshire, which dates back to 1865.






Inside and outside the magic school

The Great Hall at Hogwarts was inspired by the Dining Hall at Christ Church, in Oxford, in which some scenes from the film were filmed. Other places inside the school were filmed in the Bodleian library also in Oxford. For the outside, Durham Cathedral was used (founded in 1093 and declared a World Heritage Site in 1986) and Alnwick castle, the second biggest inhabited castle in England, once the home of the Dukes* of Northumberland.



In the village of the Hobbits

Hobbiton, "The Shire" where Bilbo Baggins, Frodo, Sam, and all the other Hobbits of *Lord of the Rings* live can be found in Matamata, in the north of New Zealand. Today it's



one of the tourist attractions of the country. To experience the fairytale atmosphere of this place, you can book a tour that allows you to walk through the fields, visit the little houses immersed* in the green of the hills and emerge yourself completely in the world created by J.R.R. Tolkien. Instead, the scenes set in Mordor were filmed in the national park of Tongariro, the oldest one in New Zealand.

between Northern Ireland, Scotland, Iceland, Marocco, Croatia and Spain. The vast white mountainous zone of Vatnajökull, where inside you can find Iceland's biggest national park (with an area of 13,600 km²) forms the biggest glacier in Europe. In the series it's the mysterious land beyond the Wall, where the mythological creatures live. The so-called* Woods of the North are a part of the National Park of Tollymorel (Northern Ireland); among the many castles in Ireland we remember Ward Castle, whose interior was transformed into the Winterfell set,

A galaxy... far, far away?

There are many real locations used as the set in various episodes of the *Star Wars* saga. The planet Tatooine, where Luke Skywalker grew up, is the city of Matmata, in Tunisia: today Luke's house is a hotel where you can stay. The Californian Redwood trees were the natural scenery for Endor, the forested moon inhabited by the Ewok; Mount Etna (Sicily, Italy) and its blazing* lava became the planet Mustafar, location of the final dual between Obi-Wan Kenobi and Anakin Skywalker, while the frozen planet of Hoth is in reality the biggest glacier in Norway.



Searching for the most sought-after* throne

The TV adaptation of the books by George R.R. Martin, *Game of Thrones* - is one of the most followed and most successful TV series of the last few years. The episodes were filmed





while the beautiful gardens in the King's Landing, where many of the characters went for a walk in the *Game of Thrones*, can be found 10km to the north of Dubrovnik (Croatia).

Life is a musical! Finally, let's fly to Los Angeles, "the city of the stars", to discover the places in *La La Land*, the musical love story between Mia and Sebastian. The

most suggestive is certainly Griffith Park, where they both dance tip tap (the scene which was also used on the film poster) at dawn with the whole city illuminated in the background. Fans of the film who are also jazz lovers, can't miss the concert at the Lighthouse Café, a historical club founded in 1949, where important jazz musicians played from Miles Davis to Chet Baker.



In this feature we're going to take a look at some interesting places to visit in Britain and some interesting facts about these places. Due to its climate, Britain is a very green place and plants and flowers grow well there. Britain has a huge number of beautiful parks and gardens and today we're going to visit some of them.

British Gardens

Yorkshire Sculpture Park, Yorkshire

At the Yorkshire Sculpture Park in Yorkshire in the north of England you can combine both art with nature. This garden is an open-air gallery full of art work by British and international artists. It was opened in 1977 in the grounds of Bretton Hall an 18th century stately home. All around the gardens magnificent sculptures and installations are placed but there are also 5 indoor galleries to visit, especially if it rains. The 'gallery without walls' as it's also called is free to enter and more than 500,000 visitors go there every year. The park also organises creative activities for kids and teenagers, especially during the school holidays.



Tresco Abbey Gardens, Isles of Scilly

Many people think that it rains all the time in Britain and certain plants and flowers are unable to grow there but this isn't totally true. The Isles of Scilly, off the coast of Cornwall have a sub-tropical climate which means they have a lot of sun. In the 19th century, a man called Augustus Smith created a garden in his home. Because of the mild climate, the sun and the high walls around the garden that protected it from the wind, many exotic* plants from around the world could grow there. Now the large garden is home to many different species of plants and flowers and it's also home to the Valhalla Museum, a collection of figureheads* from ships that sank* near the Scilly Isles.





Studley Royal Park, North Yorkshire

A man called John Aislable, who became the Chancellor of the Exchequer* in 1718, was inspired by the great gardens he saw in France, and decided to create his own in the north of England. He created a very impressive water garden with elegant lakes, canals, temples and waterfalls and also a great number of plants, trees and flowers. There's also a deer park where more than 300 deer live as well as the ruins* of a 12th century abbey. In 1986 the gardens and its abbey became a UNESCO World Heritage Site and also appeared in the 2013 BBC drama series *Death Comes to Pemberley*.

Biddulph Grange, Staffordshire

Can you imagine what an Italian terrace, a Scottish glen*, a Chinese tower and an Egyptian pyramid have in common? Well, you can find them all at these gardens in Staffordshire in central England. The gardens were created by a man called James Bateman in 1881 who wanted to imitate the things he saw on his travels around the world and create them in his own garden. However, after his death the gardens weren't looked after and the big house situated inside the garden became a children's hospital. Eventually, the gardens were restored* in the 1990s and they're now back to their former* glory.

Do you know...?

The biggest natural flower garden in the world can be found in Dubai. It's called the Dubai Miracle Garden and was opened on 14th February 2013!

Hawkstone Park Follies, Shropshire

You can have hours of fun exploring the caves, tunnels and walkways of this park and gardens in Shropshire in central England. In fact, it was used as the setting* for the BBC series the 'Chronicles of Narnia' and if you go there, you can imagine yourself looking for treasure and riding along with knights and kings and queens. Inside the park there's a 17th century Norman castle which was restored in the 1990s. The name 'folly' means a building built mainly* for decoration and you can also find a lot of these inside the park.

Lily-Rose, a young actress and model in big demand, is the oldest daughter of Vanessa Paradis – from whom she inherited* her exceptional beauty – and Johnny Depp – who has transmitted to her a strong personality and an original artistic instinct. With two very famous parents, she's already a star ready to shine on her own.

Chanel's new muse*

At 16 years old she was chosen by the fashion designer Karl Lagerfeld as the new face of Chanel and in particular of Chanel n.5 (her mother was also the face of Chanel in 1991) representing the new generation of one of the most famous and biggest selling perfumes of all time.

You divide your time between the cinema and fashion: what would you like to do when you "grow up"?

Everything! I remember that when I was a child, I wanted to be a princess, a spy, a ballerina, an actress, a model... Being an actress allows me to be

all these things. When I act I can let myself go and forget my problems and worries. Forget about "myself". I try to do it in the most natural way, without too much preparation. It's the perfect way to let out the right emotions.

Haven't you ever wanted to become a singer like your mum?

With a mum who sings and a dad who plays the guitar, it would be impossible not to love music. When I was 10 years old I performed in a school play, but it was a disaster. I was really nervous, I didn't enjoy it and I sang really badly. Then I "recuperated" singing on my mum's album *Love Songs*... I enjoyed it, but I don't think singing will become my profession.



- Lily-Rose Melody Depp was born in Paris on 27th May 1999.
- Her mum is French and she's been an actress, singer and model.
- She has a younger brother, John "Jack" Christopher Depp, born in 2002.
- She's bilingual*: she grew up in the USA but she's always spoken in French with her mum
- At 7 years old she got a terrible infection and had to spend several days in hospital, risking her life.

You have a big number of followers on social media, particularly on Instagram. How do you cope with* this fame?

I have a "public personality" that participates in red carpet* events and lets people photograph me. In my private life, however, I'm rather shy and reserved. On social media, I like the idea of choosing how and what I can let people know about me, for this reason I publish posts mainly related to my work. Protecting my privacy is becoming more and more important to me and I don't like being with my mobile all the time, I have better things to do in life... I want to live in the real world and not be a prisoner of the virtual world!

What's your life like as a "normal" girl?

Very normal! I don't like going out to bars and restaurants, I prefer going to museums or staying at home and reading a book, watching a good film and cooking. I dedicate my free time to my family and my old friends who have known me since I was

10 or 12 years old. My life is divided between Los Angeles and Paris, and I feel at home in both places, and have parts of my family in both.

Your public image is very different, and you don't give the impression that you have a quiet life...

Oh, it can seem a boring life but I'm happy. The problem is that many people think that they know me just from what they see on Instagram, but it isn't like that. And often they say or write things that aren't true. But I don't care about what people think who don't know me. I'm not interested in their opinions or criticisms if they've never even met me. It's just my way!



From the world of technology

In this feature we're going to take a look at people who have made a big contribution or left a mark in some way. Today we're going to read about people from the world of technology who have inspired us!

Queen Elizabeth II for his innovative work and so has the title of 'Sir' before his name. He also appeared at the opening ceremony of the London 2012 Olympics. He's now the director of the World Wide Web Consortium which controls the continuous development of the Internet and in 2008 he founded the Web Foundation which is an organisation that tries to make sure that everyone can have access to and use the Internet freely.

scientific research programmes. In 2009, he founded 'the Giving Pledge' where together with other successful entrepreneurs* such as Warren Buffett and Mark Zuckerberg, promised to give away at least half of his money in future years. In 2016, President Barack Obama gave the 'Presidential Medal

of Freedom' to Bill and his wife for all the charitable work they've done in the last few years.

Tim Berners Lee (London 8th June 1955)

Do you recognise this name? Do you know what he invented? Well, without him we wouldn't be able to surf the net, look at websites and visit our favourite social network. Yes, you got it! He created the World Wide Web. He's an English engineer and computer scientist and in 1989 he created a system for sharing and distributing information not just inside an office but all around the world. In 2004 he was knighted* by

Bill Gates (Seattle, USA, 28th October 1955)

Who hasn't heard of Bill Gates? In 1975, together with his friend Paul Allen, he launched Microsoft, which became the world's biggest computer software company. He's well-known for his great amount of wealth* (it's said that he's the world's richest person) but he's also known for his charitable* work through the *Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation* that he created with his wife in 2000. They donate a lot of money to different charities and

Elon Musk (South Africa, 28th June 1971)

Although he was born in South Africa, he was brought up in Canada and America. He's a businessman, engineer and inventor and has interests in many different businesses and ideas. He started his working life together with his brother when they started their own web software company. From there he developed an email payment company and eventually became interested in space exploration*. In 2002, he founded *SpaceX* which develop space exploration



technologies including rockets and space vehicles* and is now the world's biggest private producer of rocket engines. In 2011, he said that he hopes to send humans to Mars in the next 10-20 years. And it doesn't stop there! He's also the owner of *Tesla*, a producer of electric cars and *SolarCity* the second biggest producer of solar power systems in America.

Mark Zuckerberg (New York State, 14th May 1984)


Obviously you know already, but just to remind you, Mark Zuckerberg founded the social network Facebook together with his university roommates in 2004. They were all studying at Harvard University and came up with the idea for the social media site. The site grew quickly and by 2012 had about 1 billion users. In 2015, at just 30 years old, he was named one of the 100 most influential people in the world by Time magazine. In the same year, he declared that he and his wife Priscilla would give away 99% of the value of their Facebook shares to charity (worth* about \$45 billion) in the following



years. Together they created the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative to "advance human potential and promote equality in areas such as health, education, scientific research and energy".

Sergey Brin

Sergey Brin (Moscow, 21st August 1973)

Sergey was born in Russia but came to the USA at a young age. Together with his friend Larry Page, they founded the search engine Google when they were studying together at Stanford University. Eventually they gave up* university to develop their business in their garage. Google became the world's most successful search engine and both of them are now ranked* as the

world's 12th richest people. Now they're working together on other projects such as trying to help the world's energy and climate problems and working on artificial intelligence such as driverless cars and Google glasses. There's no stopping them.

Maze Runner The Death Cure

genre: Science fiction, Action

Three years after the release of the first film, the third and final chapter of the science fiction saga based on the novel by James Dashner Thomas has arrived at the cinema. Still the leader of a group of adolescents who survived the prison of the deadly Maze (from which they eventually managed to escape), he finds himself facing a new, dangerous mission - find a cure to defeat the Flare, a deadly disease that threatens mankind*. The search will be full of challenges and obstacles that will put the youngsters'* friendship and relationships to the test.

During the shooting of the film the young actor (and star of the film) Dylan O'Brien had a bad accident: in one particular action scene he fell and was hit by a moving vehicle. Production* was interrupted for a long time to give Dylan the time to recover.




