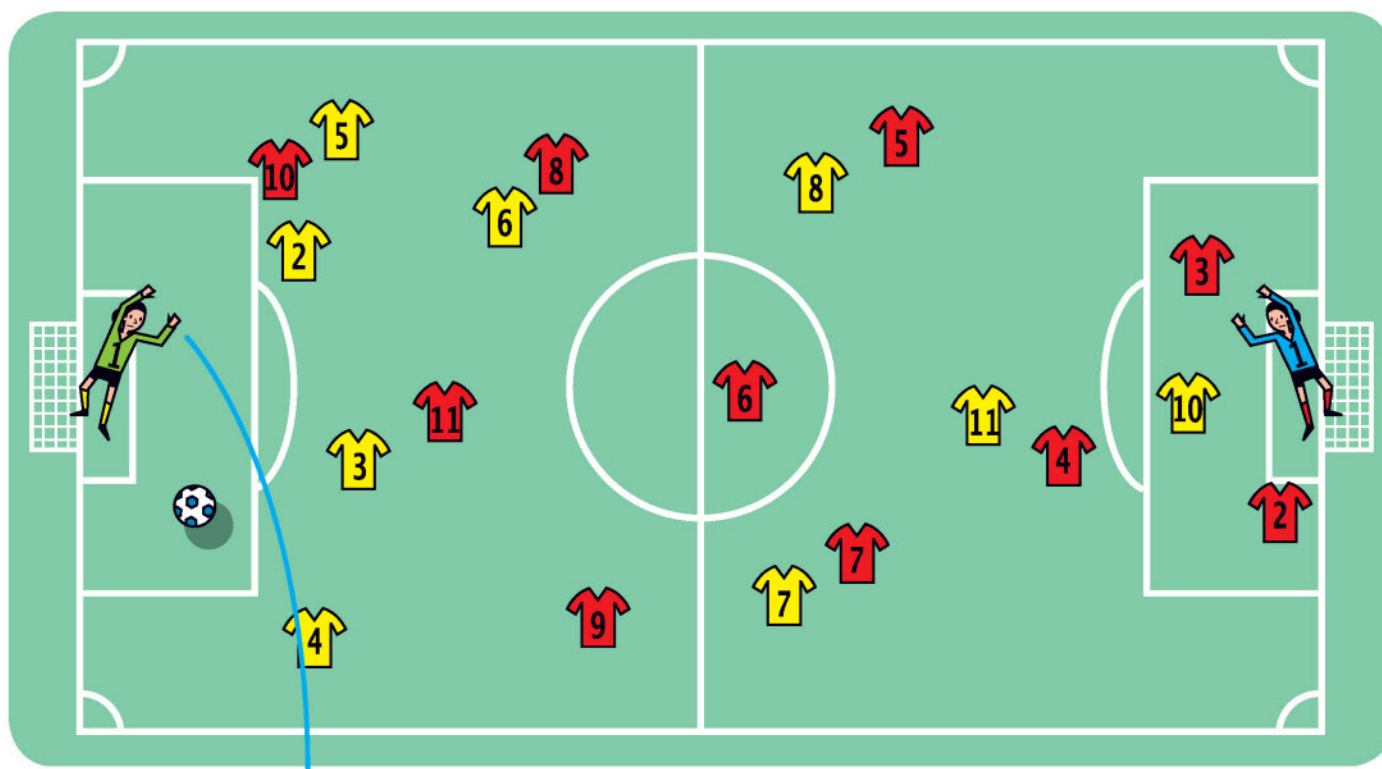


The whistle blows and the Cup Final begins. The players kick the ball, pass the ball, and head the ball to each other.

Number seven kicks the ball to number eight. She passes it on to number eleven. Number eleven heads the ball on to number ten and number ten kicks it into the goal.
- ② The blue number one of the red team throws the ball to number two. She kicks it to number seven. Number seven passes the ball to number six and she passes it to number eight. Number eight kicks the ball high in the air towards number ten, and she heads it into the goal.

- ⑦ May's number is four more than Jade's number. What is May's number?



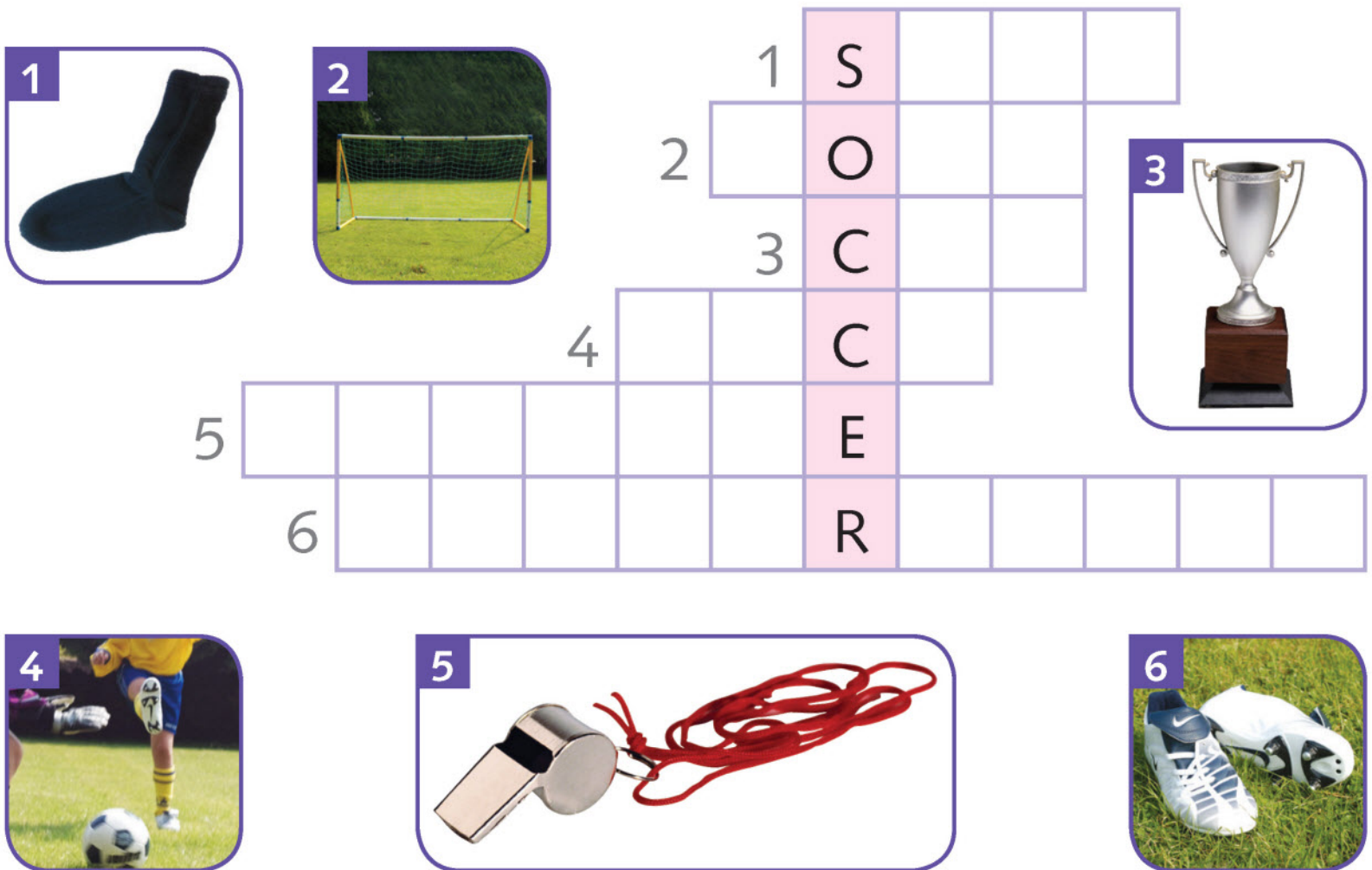
Peep! The whistle blows! The final score is 2–1. May scored the winning goal.
