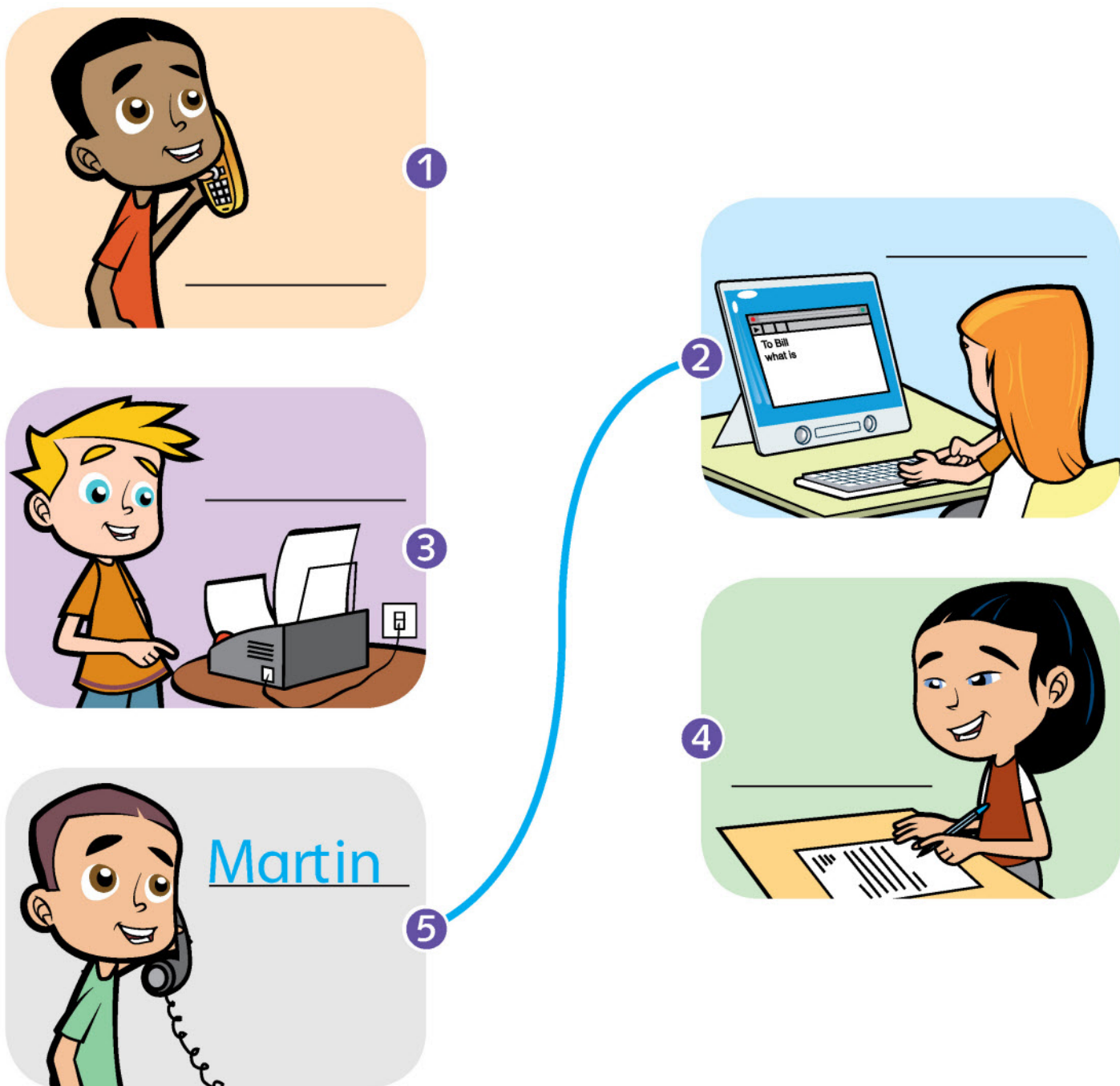


“How do we communicate with other people?” asks the teacher.
