What Do You Look Like and Why?

What color are your eyes? What shape is your nose? Why are you tall or short? There are thousands of **cells** in our bodies. They carry the information about what we look like.

This information comes from our **genes**. We get genes from both of our parents. Everyone has different genes, and that is why we're all different.








Fact box:

Only **pairs** of **identical twins** have the same genes. They look the same.

Most people in the world have brown eyes. This is because the genes for brown eyes are stronger than the genes for blue eyes. So people who have brown eyes can have the genes for brown eyes and for blue eyes, too.

This shows how two people who have brown eyes can sometimes have a child with blue eyes.

Your genes are important, but your environment can also change you. Good food, vitamins, and exercise can change how healthy you are and sometimes how tall you will grow. So remember to take care of your body and eat lots of fruit and vegetables.
